

Transworld became China's first USDA certified organic tea producer in 1989, and continues to maintain those high standards to this day, including compliance with EU and USDA food safety regulations

OUR CHINA SUSTAINABILITY INITIATIVES

Many of Transworld's farms and facilities have benefited from the work of the Rainforest Alliance and Fair Trade organizations. Below are a few of the specific locations where successful sustainability initiatives are happening:



WUYI JIULONG MOUNTAIN TEA BASE

RAINFOREST CERTIFIED CHINESE TEA FARM



Wuyi Jiulong Mountain Tea Base is one of Transworld's several Rainforest certified tea farms. It has the capacity to produce over 1.2 million kilograms of tea. Working under Rainforest Alliance's guidelines, Jiulong enhanced their sustainable agriculture practices and pesticide management. The programs included proper use of personal protection equipment (PPE), and responsible agrochemical usage.

The drive toward more sustainable Chinese tea has led to further research into reducing pesticide use while also improving farmer incomes. Under the direction of Dr. Chen Zongmao, prominent tea research scientist, a team from The Tea Research Institute and Transworld have initiated a study that includes the use of more ecofriendly bug traps. This project looks at the effects of these traps as related to reduced pesticide usage and improving yields.



SUSTAINABILITY - PEOPLE

PROMOTING PEOPLE & PLANET THROUGH POVERTY ALLEVIATION



In April 2018, Huangdu Village of Anji County (Anhui Province) coordinated with Transworld/Zhejiang Tea Group to donate 15 million green tea seedlings to poverty stricken areas. Recipients included 34 villages across Hunan, Sichuan, and Guizhou Provinces. The donation of tea seedlings and the creation of tea farms aims to further the sustainability goals of:

- Increasing incomes of villagers
- Poverty alleviation for 1,800 households
- Development of farms and facilities in accordance with soil and water conservation practices


SUSTAINABILITY - PEOPLE

TIMELINE OF THE "WHITE LEAF" SUSTAINABILITY PROJECT

2022: The "White Leaf No. 1" tea donated to the three provinces is yielded 6,000 - 8,000 kg for the year. Over 6,600 local impoverished individuals lifted out of poverty. All 37 impoverished villages donation recipients have achieved poverty alleviation. 2020: The first batch of "White Leaf No. 1" new tea harvested, covering 2,000 acres in Pu'an County and benefitting 2,577 local impoverished households through land transfer, labor, and dividend-sharing. The first phase of a 13,000-square-meter factory building in Pu'an is officially opened. 2019: "White Leaf No. 1" tea seedlings take root and start to sprout successively in three provinces and four counties. 2018: The first donated tea seeds from Anji are delivered. The Pu'an County Project is launched.

ANTI-SLAVERY AND HUMAN TRAFFICKING STATEMENT

Firsd Tea commits to ensuring that slavery and human trafficking are not taking place in our businesses or supply chains. All items are sourced ethically.

Recent news reports have raised concerns regarding the social welfare of the peoples of the Xinjiang Autonomous Region. In the spirit of transparency, Firsd Tea does not own or operate tea farms or facilities in Xinjiang, and does not engage in labor practices that involve slave labor or human trafficking.

SUSTAINABILITY - RESEARCH

In 2021, Firsd Tea launched the first-ofits-kind sustainability perspectives survey to understand how professionals within tea and related industries perceived sustainability. We discovered overwhelming apprehension about the risk of climate change on operations, cautious hope for the future, and an underprioritization of sustainability when selecting teas to offer consumers.

How worried are you about climate change's effects on your business operations?



Following up on our initial research, Firsd Tea again partnered with Tea & Coffee Trade Journal to survey professionals in tea and related industries to understand how they currently view sustainability efforts within the sector and their outlooks for the future. This report picks up on our last one to explore the following topics in depth:

Progress on sustainability factors: Most respondents in 2023 viewed tea as performing very well or somewhat well regarding reducing its environmental impact, workers' rights, gender equity, and improving the livelihood of smallholder farmers when compared with coffee and cocoa sectors.

Worries about climate change: Most survey-takers remain worried about the effects of climate change on their business operations. Tea is still considered the most sensitive industry to the effects of climate change by most professionals in tea and related industries.

Organic certification: Most respondents still agree Organic Certification is the most important standard to consumers. However, survey-takers now report Non-GMO Certification as more important to consumers than Fair Trade.

Current state and the future: Most respondents in tea and related industries report improved outlooks on progress made in sustainability from 10 years ago, the current state of sustainability in tea, and the trajectory for the next 10 years.

The Rainforest Alliance is a non-governmental organization founded in 1987 to conserve biodiversity and ensure sustainable livelihoods. In conjunction with the Ethical Tea Partnership, the Rainforest Alliance supports sustainability via:

- 1. Increasing farm productivity and climate-smart farming
- 2. Conserving biodiversity, wildlife protection, GMO crop prevention
- 3. Water and soil conservation and management

FAIRTRADE INTERNATIONAL IN CHINA

Fairtrade International was founded in 1997 as a nonprofit association of producer networks and national Fairtrade organizations. Fairtrade International works in China:

- 1. Distributing organic fertilizers to tea farmers
- 2. Providing financial assistance to college students from farmer households
- 3. Supporting community infrastructure development
